
Presidents Message

OASA Minor Committee Update

As we get ready to start the season our division conveners are ready to answer any questions that you may have regarding dates for tournaments, seeding questions for the provincials or anything else that comes to mind.

Division conveners are as follows:

If we have 3 or more teams affiliate in the Junior Mite age group we will look at identifying a division convenor to assist with organizing an OASA event for these teams.

In our Mite division this year we are looking to provide a weekend event with the OASA, PWSA and ORSA joining forces to bring together boys and girls teams in one location for the July 27-28 weekend for games as well as skills and fun activities. This event will replace our traditional Qualifier, but it will still be used as one of the primary means of seeding teams for our Provincials on the August 17 – 18 weekend.

Our Squirt Qualifier goes the July 20 – 21 weekend as well, providing the primary basis for seeding for the Provincials on the August 10 – 11 weekend.



In Pee wee the Elimination goes the July 6 – 7 weekend. The top teams from this event will determine who will be eligible to go to the Eastern Canadians August 22 – 25 in Fredericton, New Brunswick or for the first time ever to the Western Canadians August 2 – 5 in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan. Seeding for the Provincials on the August 17 – 18 weekend will also be determined at the Eliminations.

The Bantam Elimination goes on the July 6 – 7 weekend to determine which teams will go to the Canadians; the Eastern Canadians August 22 – 25 in Cite des Loisiers de Ste Perpetue, Quebec; or to the Western Canadians in Winnipeg, Manitoba August 2 – 5. The Bantam Provincials go the weekend of August 3 – 4.

In Midget the Elimination takes place on the June 29 – 30 weekend. The Canadians are August 5 – 11 in St Leonard D'aston, Quebec; the Eastern Canadians are August 22 – 25 in Fredericton, New Brunswick; and the Western Canadians are in Richmond, BC August 8 to 11. The Midget Provincials are taking place on the July 27 – 28 weekend in Teeswater.

For the first time ever Ontario and Quebec teams are being invited to the Western Canadian Championships. This will necessitate us needing to make decisions in our Pee wee, Bantam and Midget divisions immediately after the conclusion of our Eliminations. We will be allowed to have 1 team in each division go to the Western Canadians.

Once again the OASA will be joining forces with the Select teams to assist with putting on Provincial championships in each division from Mite through Midget. All divisions will be running the Provincials on Saturday August 17. The Mites will be in Kitchener Waterloo, Squirts in Woodbridge, Pee wees in Goulding Park, Bantams in Georgian Bay and the Midgets will be in Unionville.

2013 OASA Rule Changes

Over the past several years Softball Canada has been promoting Long Term Player Development (LTPD) which has resulted in several proposed new rules that place more emphasis in the younger age groups on increased player participation, skill development and fun. The OASA has reviewed the recommended rule changes from Softball Canada and will consider slowly adopting them, where we believe they will benefit the game.

For all of the minor divisions (Junior Mite to Midget) the OASA has a global set of rules that apply to all divisions as well as division specific rules. These can be obtained from the division convener or anyone on the Minor Committee.

As a result of the proposed new Softball Canada rule changes, for the 2013 season we are looking to pilot the following rule changes in these divisions:

Junior Mite (U8)

1. If a player arrives late, they may be added to the bottom of the line up.
2. The Tournament ball will be the 11" Worth soft indoor or Incrediball.
3. Wherever possible a larger home plate (19" or 21") will be used.
4. Duration of game: no new inning shall start after one hour and thirty minutes from the official beginning of the game including medal games. In the event that the game is tied after the time limit, the tie will be broken at the completion of the next full inning.
5. A courtesy runner may be used at any time for the catcher, not just when there are 2 outs.
6. No player will sit out for more than 1 consecutive inning. All players will sit out 1 inning before a player sits out a second inning. Coaches are encouraged to play all players as equally as possible over the course of the season.

Mite (U10)

1. If a player arrives late, they may be added to the bottom of the line up.
2. Duration of game: no new inning shall start after one hour and thirty minutes from the official beginning of the game, even in medal games. In the event that the game is tied after the time limit, the tie will be broken at the completion of the next full inning.
3. A courtesy runner may be used at any time for the catcher, not just when there are 2 outs.
4. No player will sit out for more than 1 consecutive inning. All players will sit out 1 inning before a player sits out a second inning. Coaches are encouraged to play all players as equally as possible over the course of the season.

Squirt (U12)

1. If a player arrives late, they may be added to the bottom of the line up.
2. Infield fly rule does not apply.
3. A team is permitted 2 defensive conferences per inning. If there is a third conference the player must be removed from the pitcher position for the remainder of that inning.
4. Coaches are encouraged to play all players as equally as possible over the course of the season.

Peewee (U14)

, **Bantam (U16)** and **Midget (U18)**

do not have any new rule changes being implemented in 2013.

The OASA Men's Committee is looking forward to a successful 2013 season. Great Lakes Tournament appears to have 8 affiliated teams that will face one another on July 26-28 in New Dundee. Teams will be playing for three available spots in the Senior Men's Championship in Stratford later in August.

The OASA is anticipating 10-12 strong junior teams to play in Owen Sound the July Long weekend. Teams will be vying for 3 spots for the Junior Canadian Championships to be held in Owen Sound, hosted by the Keady Jets Fastball Group.

We would like to thank both hosts and their organizing committees for putting in all the hard work to provide quality tournaments for our players

Softball Canada Changes

Sec. 9 CHARGED CONFERENCES

a. DEFENSIVE CONFERENCES

There shall be only three charged defensive conferences, in a seven-inning game, between the manager, or the team representative from the dugout, with the pitcher or with any other defensive player.

Exception: U14 will have 5 conferences in a 7 inning game.

1. For every inning beyond seven, there shall be one charged defensive conference per inning.
2. Conferences are accumulative and do not start over with a new pitcher entered into the game.
3. If all three conferences (5 for U14) are not used in the first seven innings, they are lost and a team must then follow the one per extra inning rule.
4. A conference includes players in the field leaving their position and going to the dugout for instructions, regardless of whether "Time" has been requested or not.
5. It is not a charged conference if the coach/manager notifies the plate umpire of a change of pitchers either before or after communicating with the pitcher.

6. The manager may legally enter fair territory to talk with any defensive player, while the new pitcher is taking his warm-up pitches, without a conference being charged.
 7. The conference is over when the manager/coach crosses the foul line returning to the dugout.
 8. It is not a charged conference for the defence if they confer during a charged offensive conference, provided they are ready to play when the offence is ready.
- Effect 9b 1: The fourth, (sixth for U14) and each additional charged conference in a seven-inning game, or for any charged conference in excess of one per inning in an extra inning game, shall result in the pitcher, who is the listed pitcher at the time of the excess conference, being declared an Illegal Pitcher, who may not pitch for the remainder of the game.
- Comment: Now only 3 defensive conferences in a game. If the game goes to extra innings they have 1 conference per inning during the extra innings. Unused conferences cannot be carried over to the next game. U14 will have 5 conferences. The penalty remains the same which is removal of the pitcher from the pitching position for the remainder of the game. The pitcher could play any other position

RULE 7 BATTING

U14 to Masters Categories only:

After entering the batter's box, the batter must remain in the box with at least one foot between pitches and while taking signals and practice swings.

Exceptions: The batter can leave the box:

- 1) When the ball is batted foul or fair
- 2) On a swing, slap or check swing
- 3) When forced out of the box by a pitch
- 4) On a wild pitch or passed ball
- 5) When a play is attempted
- 6) When time has been called
- 7) When the pitcher leaves the pitcher's circle or the catcher leaves the catcher's box
- 8) On a 3 ball count that is a strike that the batter thinks is a ball.

EFFECT: If the batter leaves the batter's box and delays play for any other reason the umpire may warn the batter or call a strike. Any number of warnings and called strikes can be made with each batter. No pitch has to be thrown.

COMMENTS: Onus is put on umpires to control this new violation. Game management will be important in our delivery of the penalty. It will be important both teams are treated in the same consistent manner. Time limit games may be handled different than other games while the category of play should be a factor umpires need to be aware of.

Younger teams' more than one warning may be appropriate while a time limit game should have limited warnings. The rule is in place to help speed up the game so it is incumbent on umpires to manage the intent of the rule.

Fast Pitch – Men's play

- Any bat that appears on the ISF approved bat list and has an ISF certification stamp will be accepted for play at a Softball Canada event. Some bats may also have the 2000 or 2004 ASA certification mark which would also be acceptable for Fast Pitch.
- The bat must meet the compression standards outlined by the ISF and can be tested to ensure that they are in the proper range.
- The bat must still pass a visual inspection per the current Softball Canada rulebook

What does this mean? Umpires will be following last year's criteria again this year.

Softball Canada follows the ASA banned bat list. The bat MUST have the 2000 or 2004 approved label, and NOT be on the current "Banned ASA" list, just like last year.

Umpires will again, be checking and putting on the stamps prior to the beginning of the tournament.

Players and Coaches should check the ASA Banned Bat List, make sure their bats have the Approved stamp, and be legal in all other areas (2 layers tape maximum on the handle, no excess dents, or ANY cracks, NO flared cone ends) Must be able to pass thru the bat ring.

Rule 2 THE PLAYING FIELD

• Sec. 4

- On any live ball play made from first base foul territory, the batter-runner and the
- defensive player may use either base. When the defensive player uses the foul portion of the double base, the batter-runner can run in fair territory and if hit by a throw from the foul side of first base, it would not be interference.

COMMENT: Allowing the first baseman to use the orange bag when a ball comes from firstbase side of foul territory may avoid collisions. It should be clear the runner or the fielder can use either base on a ball fielded on the foul side of first base. Both the runner and fielder could be touching the same base. If the fielder uses the orange base in this situation and the runner makes contact with the fielder it is interference on the runner. If both players use the white portion and the fielder causes the runner to hold up or change direction it is obstruction on the fielder.

The runner may run inside the running lane (in fair territory when the ball is fielded from first base side in foul territory. If he is hit by the ball he is not out unless he does an intentional act to cause interference like throwing up the arms or moving a hip into the thrown ball.

The 2013 Ontario Amateur Softball Association Masters championship, appears to have one of its largest fields in its 18 year history. The Jack Cook Classic which crowns the provincial champions in the A and B Divisions will be held July 19-21st in Cambridge Ontario at the Cambridge Sports Park. "The co-operation of the Masters teams has been fantastic" states Tournament Director Mike

Goodridge," We have an extremely competitive A division with defending champs Toronto Gators as well as the Cobourg Force, Waterdown Hammer and the Grimsby Diamond Kings.

We have seen a real interest in the B division recently with verbal commitments from Waterloo Classics, Waterloo Wizards, Arthur Merchants, Harwood Corners, Ohsweken Senior Braves, Stoney Creek Scrappers and interest from Niagara Falls and Sundridge.

The registration deadline date is June 10th. with information on the OASA web site and it would be encouraging to see eight teams in the B Division. There is no change in player eligibility in the A division, and there are 2 changes in the B division. The first change is that each team is allowed 3 players ages 35-39 in 2013 that are not on a 2013 OASA Senior, Int A or 2013 ISC roster and will not pitch. Players that play in the ISC 50+ Masters Division are eligible. The second change is that Masters B teams may sign 2 out of province players, but they cannot pitch. 

I lost my best friend this past winter. I met Tom Hudz in the Spring of 1986. "Do you like softball?" "My Dad raised me on baseball, does that count?" "No comparison," said Tom. That August we went to the Ontario Senior Men's Provincial Play Downs. Wow! I was hooked. We followed the boys of summer all over the map — Waterloo, Kimberly, PEI, Midland. We saw Canada win the ISCs for the very first time. Shivered in the cold, wet, 2am fog to watch a duel between Underwood and Tangaroa. Soon we'd found a circle of friends — Jack Ferguson, the NHL scout with a thousand stories; Roger May, who seldom sits, always walking, walking; Neil Fennell, hustling his Perth Shootout; Bob and Ken from Oshawa; quiet Bill Weir, standing on the first-base line; Allan from Cleveland, same seat, no hat, every day from sun-up to midnight; Warren Hess and his wife, the Yankee fans; the Skinners, watching their "boys," Larry and Grant. A few wives. Some of them, like me, real fans. Some just along for the ride. Watch the games. Bask in the sun. Read the morning paper with a blow-by-blow of yesterday's games. Argue stats: "Who's the greatest pitcher you ever saw?" or "Remember when...?" Tom could rhyme off details of games he'd seen 20, 25 years ago. Sorenson was his hero — the finest ball player he'd ever seen. We weren't "homers." We watched all the games. It wasn't "Which team is playing?" it was "Who's pitching?" People would ask: Which is your team? or Do you have a son playing? Nope. Nope. We don't have a favourite team. We just love softball. From early morning 'til late at night — 12 hours of ball a day. ONTARIO AMATEUR SOFTBALL ASSOCIATION
SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY
(approved May, 2013)

DEFINITIONS

1. The following terms have these meanings in this Policy:
 - a) "Social media" – The catch-all term that is applied broadly to computer-mediated communication media such as blogs, YouTube, Facebook, Instagram, Tumblr, and Twitter, etc.
 - b) "Member"- All categories of membership defined in the Ontario Amateur Softball Association (OASA) Bylaws, as well as all individuals employed by or engaged in activities with OASA, including but not limited to, athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers, directors, officers, team managers, team captains, medical and paramedical personnel, administrators and employees.
 - c) "Case Manager" – The person or organization appointed by OASA to oversee management and administration of complaints.

PREAMBLE

2. OASA is aware that Member interaction and communication occurs frequently on Social Media. OASA cautions Members that any conduct falling short of the standard of behaviour required by the OASA Code of Conduct will be subject to the disciplinary sanctions identified within the OASA Discipline Policy.

APPLICATION

3. This Policy applies to all Members as defined in the Definitions.

CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOUR

4. Per the OASA Discipline Policy and Code of Conduct, the following Social Media conduct may be considered minor or major infractions at the discretion of the Case Manager:

- a) Posting a disrespectful, hateful, insulting, or otherwise negative comment on a personal blog, in a Facebook post or note, or as a Tweet on Twitter, that is directed at Members or at other persons connected with OASA and/or other National Federations, Softball Canada, the International Softball Federation and related events.
- b) Posting a disparaging or harmful comment on a personal blog, in a Facebook post or note, or as a Tweet on Twitter, that is directed at OASA and/or other National Federations, Softball Canada, the International Softball Federation and related events.
- c) Creating or contributing to a Facebook group, webpage, blog, or online forum devoted solely or in part to promoting negative or disparaging remarks or commentary about OASA or its reputation and other National Federations, Softball Canada, the International Softball Federation and related events.
- d) Posting a picture, altered picture, or video on Facebook, Tumblr, Twitter, YouTube, or other social medium that is harmful, disrespectful, insulting, or otherwise offensive, and that is directed at Members or at other persons connected with OASA and other National Federations, Softball Canada, the International Softball Federation and related events.
- e) Any instance of cyber-bullying or cyber-harassment between one Member and another Member (including a teammate, coach, opponent, volunteer, or official), where incidents of cyber-bullying and cyber-harassment can include but are not limited to the following conduct on any social medium, via text-message, or via email: regular insults, negative comments, vexatious behaviour, pranks or jokes, threats, posing as another person, spreading rumours or lies, or other harmful behaviour.
- f) Any instance of bringing the game of softball into disrepute.

5. All conduct and behaviour occurring on Social Media may be subject to the OASA Discipline Policy at the discretion of the Case Manager.

MEMBER RESPONSIBILITIES

6. Members must be aware that their Social Media use may be monitored by OASA or by the Members' provincial/territorial or local softball associations.

7. When using Social Media, a Member must model appropriate behaviour benefitting the Member's status as a member of OASA.

8. Removing content from Social Media after it has been posted (either publicly or privately) does not excuse the Member from being subject to the OASA Discipline Policy.

9. A member who believes that the Social Media use by another member is inappropriate or may violate of OASA's policies and procedures should report the matter to OASA in the manner outlined by the OASA Discipline Policy.
